



Borrowing Bunnies: A Surprising True Tale of Fostering Rabbits by Cynthia Lord

A global advocate for forests and our relationship with trees shares the mysteries and magic of the forest in language kids can understand. Includes quizzes and hands-on activities.




Cat Science Unleashed!: Fun Activities to do with Your Feline Friend by Jodi Wheeler-Toppin


The Crayon Man: The True Story of the Invention of Crayola Crayons by Natascha Biebow

An inspiring picture book biography of storyteller, puppeteer, and New York City's first Puerto Rican librarian, who championed bilingual literature.




The Polar Bears: Survival on the Ice by Jason Viola


The Proper Way to Meet a Hedgehog: and Other How-To Poems by Paul B. Janeczko


Seashells: More than a Home by Melissa Stewart


Skulls! by Blair Thornburgh


The Undefeated by Kwame Alexander
